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The Glocal Changemaker Imbizo Comic collection is a series of manga-style comics that showcase the stories of activists from the Global South who are taking action against global injustices such as gender inequality, forced migration, land rights, and racism. The collection highlights the voices of activists from Brazil, South Africa, and Cameroon, offering fair and comprehensive perspectives on how global challenges show up in their local contexts and the different solutions and tools that are being used by these activists to take action.

Additionally, the comics aims to redefine the idea of a superhero as ordinary people who care about the world and want to see positive change; breaking free from the harmful and outdated hetero patriarchal image of agents of change as people (usually a man) with super powers, coming from elsewhere to save us.

It emphasizes that ordinary people, like you and I, regardless of gender, working together in community with each other, are changemakers.

We hope that these comics will inspire hope and action amongst young readers. Encouraging them to work with others and use their collective resources to create a fairer world for all.

Lastly, we hope that you will use this comic as a tool for envisioning a better world, envisioning yourself as an agent for that changed world and start mapping out a starting point for yourself.

STORY 1: Yolanda DyantyiA Journey of Feminist Activism and Solidarity























STORY 2: Lusi Mahote Lwanda's Journey of Digital Activism

This story showcases the courageous and powerful journey of a multi-talented South African trans woman, artist, and changemaker who uses art as a medium to address and speak out about the social injustices faced by queer folks. Additionally, she utilises social media as a tool to foster connection, belonging, and a sense of community. The story aims to highlight that living openly as a trans person is an act of great courage, which is often made more difficult by discrimination and transphobia. It serves as a reminder of the work that still lies ahead in the fight for a more empathetic, loving, and inclusive world for all. Furthermore, it sheds light on the urgent need for safer spaces, both online and offline, where trans individuals can thrive, and be in solidarity with each other without fear of discrimination or the pressure of explaining.




Beyond Borders of Exploitation: Hugo's Quest for Indigenous Justice in Brazil

















Story 4: Thabo ThindiBlack Faces in White? Space.





















Story 5: Djiff DjimeliThe Forgotten Migrants.

Through film he offers counter hegemonic perspectives on migration and emphasises that migration/movement is an integral part of the human experience therefore attempts to subvert & control this movement are an infringement of the humanity of those who migrate. 













